FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Back at the end of July, 29 people from our congregation attended Synod School at Buena Vista University in Storm Lake, IA. I have been there before (this was my fifth year in attendance in the last seven years), but this was one of the best years. The keynote speaker, the worship (particularly the music), and the workshops I took were all inspiring and educational. There was a great consistency to the theme of the keynote speaker and several of the workshops I took. But there was one workshop I did not mean to take. I had signed up for a class called "Immersed in the World" which I assumed would be a class about how the local church participates in the wider community. (Apparently, I do not read course descriptions.) When I got to the class the facilitator got out pads of paper and pens and started talking about creative writing. I got my schedule back out and looked again. The class was actually called "Immersed in the Word" and was a creative writing class. My first thought was, "I am out of here." Poetry and creative writing are not really my thing. But so as not to be rude I stuck out the first class. Lo and behold it became a class to which I looked forward each day. Every day started with reading a Scripture passage by lectio divina. Lectio Divina is slow, deliberate reading of the same passage several times. The first time, you just listen. The second time you read it you listen for a meaningful word or phrase. The third time you read it you listen with the question in mind, "What is God saying to me in this passage?" or "What does God want me to do?" Then we would begin writing. One day it was poetry. Another day it was entering a Bible story as one of the characters or props and telling the story from our perspective. Another day was writing our spiritual memoirs (a telling of a significant spiritual event or journey). In all these ways I allowed myself to open up and try something new and experienced an outpouring of creativity.

So, lesson number one: try new things. I did not share what I wrote with the class, or even very many people. I just let it enhance my understanding of my own thoughts or a Scripture passage. I learned a lot about myself. I learned to get out those things that are inside looking for an outlet. I never would have done that without that simple mistake of misreading the name of the class. So try something new. Try journaling your prayers or doodle while you pray. Try a new way of reading scripture or a new style of prayer. Do something to break out of the ordinary practices of your faith and tap into some creativity.

Lesson number two: Try your hand at writing in particular. You do not have to share your writing. You will not be judged on its quality. There is no need to even keep it long if you don't like. But I find that spirituality and creativity often go hand in hand. So let me give you an easy assignment to begin. Pick a Bible story. It is easier if it is a story and not a psalm or something out of the letters of Paul. Pick a story, take on the perspective of one of the characters, or a prop in the story, or make up a character, like a

by-stander, or an animal in the background, and write what you see from their perspective. Just write until you are done. Try that once. If you like it, try it again. Try it for a week. Pick a new story each day. It will open your eyes to the story and draw out your creativity.

I have become a big believer in the power of writing. It is powerful stuff. Give it a try; it may be the key to unlock a new experience with God and God's Word.

John McCain talked with his family and friends about his approaching death, what he had done about his finances, and what he wanted for his funeral service(s). Both families grieved. But which family do you think had the least anxieties and worries when their loved one died?

From our experience, the answer is clearly John McCain's family. Moreover, we believe that we all want our families and friends to focus on the good memories rather than being apprehensive about dealing with our estate, doing what we want about our funeral, closing accounts, etc. But often we postpone the thoughts, the talks, and the tasks necessary to remove the uncertainties our families will have after we die. We will also discuss ideas/questions about dealing with grief--our own or that of others...why do we grieve, what to say (to ourselves/to others), does it ever end, etc.

Our two four-week workshops will help you bring peace and direction to those who will have to close your estate. The first one will held September 16, 23, 30, and October 7. It is geared mostly to those of us old enough to be AARP members (or those who are responsible for family members this old). Because of your participation, we have been able to keep the "minimum donations" at the same level as last year even though the price of the local fruit we have picked has been higher. Of course, many of you say those much-loved words "Keep the change" – thank you for that, too.

The raspberry season is here and we hope to have plenty of raspberry jam (regular, seedless, and Splenda types) ready for the Church Picnic or the week after. Please continue to bring back your empty jars with the bands (and tops if undamaged). Keep an eye out for coupons for new jars and bring them in too – every little helps us towards building the kingdom by helping the children of Madagascar.

P.S. The Reformed Church in Madagascar, with which the PC(USA) partners, just celebrated the 50th anniversary of its formation from several missions. It is a large, but not well-funded organization. Several Presbyterian World Missions representatives were there for the celebration (see below).
